“And who is my neighbor?” Sadly we still ask this question to rationalize or justify unacceptable, immoral behavior for if “they” are not human (sadly a question raised regarding native peoples during the Spanish Conquest ... along with the church's response of attacking this claim by baptizing and coming into communion with these people) or that they are somehow “less” human (the stain and scandal of the three-fifths “compromise”). Until we are able to look into the eyes of even those we consider “less than,” an enemy or adversary, and recognize a child of God who is my brother or sister... we are continuing this blindness.

St. Peter Claver, a Jesuit Priest, knew his neighbor, his sister and brother to be those least who the world used, abused and discarded. As one of my patrons you hear me mention his name during the Eucharistic Prayer. You might question his inclusion as a part of Black History month, but Peter is the patron of African missions and of interracial justice, due to his work with slaves in Colombia.

Peter Claver was born in 1581 to an upper class, cash poor family in Verdu, Spain. After earning his first degree in Barcelona, he entered the Jesuits in 1601. While studying philosophy Claver was encouraged to go to the missions in America. When he completed his philosophy studies and it was time for his two to three year fulltime ministry experience before theological studies and ordination, Peter agreed and was sent to Cartagena, Colombia arriving in 1610. After completing this time of service and his Theological studies in Bogotá, Peter was ordained in 1616.

Fr. Peter was assigned to Cartagena... one of the two ports where slaves from Africa arrived to be sold in South America. Between the years 1616 and 1650, Peter Claver worked daily to minister to the needs of the 10,000 slaves who arrived each year.

I won't focus on the squalor, disease, stench and inhumane conditions he found on board these ships but Peter would not leave an arriving vessel until every person held in that ship's hold received some measure of care and compassion. He brought with him fruits, biscuits, and sweets which he had begged for. Peter used his skill as a doctor to tend to their wounds. Eventually he found translators to come with him and assist him in treating these men, woman and children not as property, but as human.

“We must speak to them with our hands before we speak to them with our lips.”

Peter gave them a short instruction in the Catholic faith and baptized as many as he could. As they were Catholic, Peter was able to get pressure on slave owners to give humane treatment to fellow Christians and allow them to partake of the sacraments. Peter Claver baptized more than 300,000 slaves by 1651, when he was sickened by the plague.

In the last years of his life Peter was too ill to leave his room. In 1654 Peter was anointed with the oil of the Sacrament of “Extreme Unction.” (Please note that at this time the “Sacrament of the Sick” was generally reserved for the final hours of life.) When the news of his approaching death got out, people crowded into his room to see him for the last time. Peter died September 7, 1654. St. Peter Claver was canonized in 1888. His memorial is celebrated on September 9.

St. Peter Claver's influence continues today through the Knights of Peter Claver. The Knights of Peter Claver, Inc. is the largest historically African-American Catholic lay organization in the United States. The Knights of Peter Claver organization were founded in 1909 in Mobile, Alabama. The organization was founded by the Josephites, a Catholic order whose mission was to serve Catholic African Americans.

By 1910, the Knights of Peter Claver had branches in Norfolk and Richmond, Virginia; Nashville, Tennessee; and several towns in Mississippi. They later spread to the North as well and became a national presence by 1946. Today their headquarters is located in New Orleans.

In the 1930's the Knights worked to support black priests and help keep them in the United States rather than being sent to Africa as missionaries. They recognized that the Catholic community needed priests of color to serve in parishes and positions of leadership not just in foreign lands but also here in the United States. In the 1940's they worked to end segregation in the Catholic Churches. During the civil rights movement, the Knights also worked with the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and the National Urban League.

The Knights and their Ladies Auxiliary continue to render service to God and His Holy Church, render aid and assistance to the sick and disabled, and promote social and intellectual association among its members.

Our young people very much need the good example of Christian men and women continuing to live lives which promote mutual friendship, unity and Christian charity.

Fast and Abstinence

The Church calls upon its members to put themselves in union with the suffering of Christ by acts of personal sacrifice. Because Friday was the day Jesus’ suffering and death, the Church asks Catholics **to abstain from eating meat on all the Fridays of Lent**. Fasting from food for periods of time and abstaining from meat on designated days inserts us into the suffering of Jesus, who in turn give meaning to our penitential acts. The roots of fasting go back to Jesus who fasted for 40 days before starting his public ministry.

Fasting Regulations: Fasting allows only one full meal and 2 lighter meals in the course of the day, and prohibits eating solid foods between meals. All adults are bound by the law of fast up to the beginning of their 60th year.

Abstinence Regulations: Abstinence forbids the the eating of meat. All persons who have completed their 14th year (day after one’s 14th birthday) are bound by the of abstinence. **In the USA, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence; all other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence (only).**
