From Fr. Bill

She was deeply disappointed with the recent synod's document on Youth and Pope Francis' request to the US Bishops to postpone their decisions on the response to the Pennsylvania Report and other abuse allegations. I must admit that my first reaction shares her disappointment... but prayer, study and reflection have modified my opinion.

I need to give you a little background on my personal experience to understand the shift in my perspective. First, I was involved with formation of young men to the priesthood and religious life for several years. I was also involved in promoting vocations to religious life and at one point was Vocation Director for the Salesians of Don Bosco in the western United States. These different responsibilities required that I attend international gatherings and study internationally developed documents regarding vocations and the formation of men to Salesian Religious Life and priesthood. These experiences I will now apply to her areas of disappointment.

What is "youth?" Please realize that Salesians (my background) are trained as a youth and young adult specialists. It is a part of the Salesians gift to the church to be signs and bearers of God's love for the young.

Asking what "youth" is, may seem dumb, but please know that the American definition of youth is at variance with the international definition. Americans think youth are kids (mostly teens). The rest of the non-Anglo world considers "youth" to be young men and women of the age of consent, usually already working and getting ready for married life. At World Youth Day the world is surprised we send children (who need protection and supervision) when from our perspective they are sending "Young Adults." When the universal church gathers to discuss youth, they are focused on young people 18 to 35 years of age.

The US bishops' attempt to address "child abuse" in the document was resisted by the world's bishops and youth as from their understanding they gathered to focus on "Youth" NOT "children." This is why the subject of abuse was broadened and not specifically highlighting children: power, economic, conscience and sexual were the types of abuse which were condemned. They praised those who bring these evils to light and work to confront and change them. The majority participating felt this was not the right forum to discuss the abuse of children.

What is "sexual child abuse?" I remember being stunned to discover in discussion groups with people from other nations that when we Americans were speaking of "abuse of children," they were understanding and translating it as homosexuality. Please realize that the United States is viewed as a promoter of homosexuality. Know that I have been in

discussions with educated adults who testify that their nations (e.g. Mexico) have no homosexuals or that the number is so small as to be not worth mentioning. Practicing homosexuality is still considered a crime in many nations and in Muslim nations can result in the death penalty. The section of the Youth Synod Document which addresses homosexuality was a part of the world's response to the abuse situation which they view as an Anglo-Saxon (US, Canada, Ireland, England, Australia) "cultural" problem. We can claim they live in denial, but they claim it is the fruit of our promiscuous culture. Both probably have some truth.

What is the "age of consent?" Please realize that in a very few nations, girls as young as 8 years of age can and do enter into marriage. Please know that the church recognizes that a 14-year-old can take vows of Religious Life or enter into marriage (I do know women who were married at 14.), but asks the local church to follow their country's standards. Given the varied understanding on the age of consent and the United States' categorizing of sex by an adult (over 18) with minor (those under 18) as child abuse has resulted in 18 year olds (who had had what they thought was consensual sex with a fellow high school student) being classified as registered child abusers. Our American standards result in ephebophiles (those attracted to post-pubescent teens, usually 15 to 19) and pedophiles (those attracted to pre-pubescent children) being grouped together... when the majority of the world considers pedophilia to be the behavior considered aberrant and worthy of condemnation. Therefore, what we often describe as child abuse (under 18) much of the world may consider consensual (over 13). By the way, the reason much of the Catholic world requires fasting to begin at 14 years of age, but in the church of the United States begins at 18 is directly related to what is considered the age of consent.

Pope Francis actually did the American Catholic Church a favor by asking they postpone their decisions until after the February meetings with the Vatican. I am sorry to say that some of our US Bishops, in my opinion, are not thinking clearly. I have spoken in favor of bringing to light our history and the probable abuse allegations so that we end the seemingly unending gradual releases of 20th century cases. Evidentially, some US bishops are unwilling to commit to this. Maybe they are afraid of admitting responsibility or opening themselves to lawsuits, but regardless, Pope Francis realized that the American Church was not ready yet to speak with one voice on this point and asked them to discuss, reflect, pray and postpone til after the February meetings their final resolutions. Pray for our bishops as they need to get on the same page for our response.

This doesn't eliminate my disappointment but helps me better understand the synod and the pope's decisions.

Mass Intentions (Revision for 2019)

Arranging to have Mass offered for someone sick or for a special intention, or for a departed loved one in your family, is a long-standing tradition for Catholics. In order to accommodate all our families who wish to have mass offered for a special intention at St. Jerome, we will be using the following guidelines regarding Mass intentions:

- On Monday, December 3, 2018 (office is closed on December 1st) the mass book for 2019 will be available to accept mass intentions for the entire year. (The six month booking restriction is eliminated.)
 - Not more than two masses per month will be said for each registered parishioner. Also, the two masses should not be on the same Sunday. Restricting requests allows for other parish families to have the opportunity to schedule masses when situations arise.
 - If you already have a Mass intention booked and would like to add another person or group to that date, (provided it's done prior to the bulletin printing) only the initial requester has the option to place additional names to that date. It would not be counted as a new request. We will accept up to (3) names or groups for one Mass.
 - A Bereavement Mass for those who recently passed will be reserved on the second Saturday of each month at 8A.M. If you wish to have the deceased person included in this Group Mass of remembrance, please contact the rectory to give them the name and required stipend. This will not be counted as a monthly limit request. We can include this deceased person for at least 12 months with a stipend for each month.
 - During the month of May, we arrange for a Novena of Masses for Mothers' Day; and during June, a Novena of Masses for Fathers' Day. During the month of November, the Rectory Office arranges Mass each day for the All Souls remembrance. Families present names of their loved ones and an All Souls offering in the special envelope provided.
 - One Mass each weekend (Saturday: 5:30pm, Sunday: 7:30am, 9am, 11am, 5:30pm) is reserved for the intentions of all St. Jerome parishioners.
 - It is customary to offer a Mass stipend or donation for each Mass arranged.
- The suggested stipend for a weekday Mass is \$10 and \$20 for a weekend Mass (Saturday: 5:30pm, Sunday: 7:30am, 9am, 11am, 5:30pm.)
- To arrange a Mass intention:
 - You can go to the Rectory Office during business hours or the hall on the monthly Parish Staff Sunday.
 - Mail the request for a Mass intention along with the stipend to the Rectory office.
 - Phone request will be taken only during business hours with the parish secretary or volunteer.
 - Email your request to Roxanne Shaw, the parish secretary at: rshaw@stjeromewestchester.org (payment for phone or email requests will be discussed with you by the secretary or volunteer.)
