"If only I had this I would be happy."

When I encounter people who believe they can only be happy if they are married, I try to open their eyes to the truth that although marriage is a sacrament and does offer special graces... by itself, having a ring on your finger won't make you happy.

While working with young adults at St. Joseph's Retreat Center in Rosemead I worked hard at helping young adults learn to accept the person God had made them and within that to live a generous, joyful life. Once their focus shifted from being a desperate single trolling for a partner, generally everything changed for them. The decision to living a life uplifting others helped them to recognize and appreciate the person God had made them. The decision and commitment to finding joy in the ordinary, of being that person made on purpose for a purpose... projected a sense of peace, joy and cheerfulness that actually made others want to be with and near them. Many of these people living this grace-filled life discovered a friend who has become that life-long partner in marriage.

It wasn't marriage which brought them happiness. Happiness was something they carried with them in their life, their friendships and their marriage.

I have known happy people with virtually nothing living on a garbage dump in Tijuana. I have known people who seem to have virtually everything in Bel Air who have taken their own life.

If you are like Eeyore before you are married, you will be Eeyore after you are married. If you are depressed and gloomy before you get something or someone, you will still be depressed and gloomy afterward. Ultimately, regardless of the accessories you have, underneath them all, you still are you.

Happiness is learning to accept what is. It involves not letting envy and jealous blind us from the gifts and opportunities that God is laying before us. If God wanted me to be that other person, I would already be them. I need to work on appreciating who He has made me, for we are wonderfully made. "God grant me the serenity to accept the things I can not change. Courage to change the things I can, And the wisdom to know the difference."

Happiness is an inside job.

Sadly, some people don't feel at home in their own skin. I feel sorry for them. Back in the dark ages (until around 1990) counseling, therapy, diet, study, prayer, exercise and often medication used to be the path recommended for dealing with this. Some people in the midst of their depression and listlessness seek a magic feather (Dumbo, believes he needs a magic feather to fly.) to make them happy.

Perhaps faith in science and technology can save you? "You think you are that? We can fix that now!"

Please don't write me off as a hater because I feel pity and compassion for these people struggling with their identity. I can't and won't condemn them. They need more help, prayer and support than I carry in the tool kit that God has given me. I do feel for them and their parents.

The advances in technology, medicine and surgery are making (with the right amount of money) almost all outward appearances and even internal organs, capable of being altered. In the "Hunger Games" you may have noticed people with cat-like ears and tails. We can do this now, but don't have the technical knowledge and skill with our nervous system as yet to have the ears actually move as does a cat's ears or tail... but you can be "modified."

These hurting people sometimes speak of being rushed along the path to a new identity. They are told how brave they are. They are encouraged and supported in their hope that this transformation will make everything as they believe it should have been. They, like all people, want to be happy.

Studies continue to show that many of these trans-people seem to find that the grass wasn't really greener on the other side. Even with pre and post-surgery support, their depression and personal demons remain with them. Although they may have been physically transformed, they discover they can't run away from themselves.

Just as marriage is not a magic feather to happiness, so too, surgery is not magic wand to happiness. These body altering modifications can distract one from the task of learning to recognize, appreciate and accept who they really are. These steps take time and intentional effort. Learning how to accept one's self can be a daunting task. Learning to live my life as gift and blessing require grace, patience and effort.

I guess the surgery offers them hope as before surgery 14% had attempted suicide (verses 1.6% of the general population). As of 2018, after trans-surgery 41% report attempting suicide. This is female to male 50.8% (73.9% in 2014 studies). This is male to female 29.9% (62.5% in 2014 studies). These improvements in lowering the attempted suicide rate after trans-surgery are seen as progress resulting from greater public acceptance and family support.

Sorry, magic feather. Even with the declining percentage of suicide attempts after surgery, we can see that the surgery, like a wedding ring by itself, doesn't bring happiness to life.

As Catholics we are called to treat others with mercy, love, kindness and respect... as we would like to be treated. Jesus doesn't call us to condemn others but to love and be merciful, as He has been merciful with us. This praying for and loving is not just with those who think and act like us ("which even the pagans do") but is especially for those who think differently and chose to act differently than we do. We should stand out as witnesses in the world because of our love of others. Be gentle. Be kind. Even if... whatever.
