
From Fr. Bill

Have Christians ever been the majority of people in the world? Not yet. Jesus' gospel and command to go forth and baptize all nations still has many people waiting to discover the good news (gospel). Not that some of God's people haven't been continuing the mission and ministry of Jesus Christ.

In 1800 it is estimated that 23% of the world's population was Christian. By 1900 it is estimated that we had reached and converted 34% of the world's population to Christianity. By 2000, although there are more Christians than ever before, we have now lead approximately 32% of humanity to Christ and baptism. Factors contributing to the slight decline in percentage are China and India's population explosions during the 20th century as well as the contraceptive and pro-abortion philosophies that have reduced many Christian families' size (In the United States from nearly 5 to 2.3 to 1.9 children per family, which is now below replacement level).

In the United States according to 2016 statistics, 73.7% of Americans are Christian: 48.9% Protestant and 23% Catholic. 18.2% identify themselves as "none of the above."

According to studies by the Pew Research Center over the past century, the number of Catholics around the world has more than tripled. As of 2010, there were nearly 1.1 billion Catholics, up from an estimated 291 million in 1910. Catholics comprise 50 percent of all Christians worldwide and 16 percent of the world's total population.



In 2010, the majority of the world's Catholics were to be found in the Latin American region (39 percent, or 425 million). In 1910, two-thirds of Catholics (65 percent) lived in Europe. By 2010, only about a quarter of Catholics (24 percent) lived in Europe.

According to a 2012 review by the National Council of Churches, the three largest denominations in the United States are: The Catholic Church, 68,202,492 members (23% of Americans); The Southern Baptist Convention, 16,136,044 members (5.3%); and The United Methodist Church, 7,679,850 members.

In the United States the major shift the 21st century has been the decline of ex-Catholics as the second largest group, and the growth in the "none of the above" from less than 2%. These appear to be young adults who in previous generations tended to return to a church when building a family. This generation has been indoctrinated in college studies which openly mock religion and identify belief in God and practice of religion as the source of evil in the world and a means to control people. (Marxism remains alive in too many universities.) This has led many young adults to put their faith in pseudo-science with a philosophy that there is no universal truth except that everything (morality and truth) is relative. 9-11 and the leadership scandal in the Catholic Church helped collaborate their professor's Marx's views on Religion and contributed to the growth of the none of the above. (Please note that the none of the above do have a higher than usual issues with depression, alcohol and drug abuse, as well as suicide. They need the gospel as their lives lack purpose and meaning which science can not give.)

Rather than complain, this is a challenge and call to authenticity and holiness to each Catholic. After all, WE are the witnesses and it is MY life that will give testimony to others and either bring them closer to Christ or away from Christ.

We rejoice with our RCIA group as they come closer to Christ by receiving and completing the Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist.


